A Message from Pastor Rick: When talking with my parents about the horrific shootings in Charleston, my dad shared with me something he was going to use in a sermon. Some of you might remember these words from the musical "South Pacific."

You've got to be taught To hate and fear, You've got to be taught From year to year, It's got to be drummed In your dear little ear You've got to be carefully taught.

You've got to be taught to be afraid Of people whose eyes are oddly made, And people whose skin is a diff'rent shade, You've got to be carefully taught.

You've got to be taught before it's too late, Before you are six or seven or eight, To hate all the people your relatives hate, You've got to be carefully taught!

Hate and racism are not things that come about naturally. Rather, they are learned behaviors. Someone has to teach you to feel and act in these negative ways. Unfortunately, we (as a culture) have been teaching this to our children. Racism may not be a part of what you have taught your children, but we are also responsible for how all of the children in our community are raised.

As individuals and as a faith community, we can do a lot to try to change racist behavior.

- First, we should agree that there is no room for any type of speech that degrades or belittles anyone. This refers not only to jokes, but also stereotypes we might make about a particular ethnic group or class of people.
- Second, we do everything we can to help people use language that sows seeds of love rather than hate.
- My third suggestion is both for the individual and community. We need to step up and speak out whenever we witness acts of hate or racism by individuals or any group. This includes calling out business owners, organizations, and government officials when we see inappropriate behavior or an attempt to discriminate against any person or group.

I invite all of you to join me for one opportunity to stand up and love all people as God has called us to do. **On July 25, there will be a Walk against Racism at 1PM** beginning at New Providence Presbyterian Church. This event was planned prior to the Charleston shootings. It will be a wonderful opportunity to stand with our brothers and sisters from many faith communities and many walks of life to show that we stand for love and fair treatment of all God's children.



The Southeastern Synod of the ELCA held their 2015 Assembly in Birmingham, AL on Jun 5-7. St. Paul Lutheran Church was represented by Pastor Rick, Beth Drane, and Bob Ullom. Sue was also extremely busy herding the volunteers as they insured the smooth running of the Assembly. The Assembly was spiritually uplifting, very informative, and the business of the synod was accomplished. There were four plenary sessions which allowed business to be conducted, but also allowed time for bible study and general reports from most all the synod ministries and special subject teams. A special part of the Assembly was the electing of numerous people, both new and returning to office, for the functioning of the Southeastern Synod. We had the opportunity to go to workshops of our choice and had Beth and I had the special opportunity to spend two and a half hours with Dr. Mark Allen Powell, an internationally known biblical scholar and writer of more than 25 books on the Bible and religion. 

Our bible studies are complete and the youth are ready to **Rise Up** in Detroit July 14th – July 19th. Many have asked, "What will you be doing in Detroit?"

Well...The Gathering's program is built around three opportunities to proclaim 'the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God' (Mark 1:1): **Proclaim Story**, **Proclaim Justice**, and **Proclaim Community**.

On our Proclaim Story day, we will learn that God's story is a love story, and that all of God's people have an important role in this story. Everything we do is "The beginning of the good news…" and, as followers of Jesus, we are sent to live out the rest of this story through discipleship. Through storytelling, music, bible study, interactive learning and worship, we will dwell in God's story, begin to articulate our own story, engage each other's story and be sent out to proclaim that Jesus = good news.

On our Proclaim Justice day, we will work alongside Detroiters helping them to recreate an American city. We have the unique opportunity to see first-hand the resiliency of the people of Detroit. While we have not received our work assignment at this time, we could be boarding up windows, cleaning vacant lots, building playgrounds, planting gardens, making food at a shelter, etc.

On our Proclaim Community day, we will visit the interactive learning center and in doing so follow Jesus on the way to the cross. Through a variety of mediums, such as art, music, technology, sports, community, fun, and reflection, students will be challenged to: recognize the good news in all relationships while working to-ward reconciliation in Christ, listen before speaking and ultimately proclaim the good news in our own communities.

Why is this important for our youth to be involved in The Gathering?

We are meant to be together, and we are a church that believes God is calling us into the world – together. Every three years we gather youth and adults together to share their unique stories and to experience the larger story that makes up the ELCA, we gather to be inspired, encouraged, strengthened, connected and sent out to do God's work in the world – together! In Detroit we will learn that as individuals, as communities, as a collective humanity, we are called and claimed as characters in and witnesses to God's divine story, a story that always moves through the cross to the resurrection.

I am confident that we will all be touched by God's story unfolding in Detroit. We will return home more aware of our place in God's story, a story enhanced by the stories of others, especially those who are different from us. We will be encouraged to see ourselves as essential witnesses to God's story in the world as we learn to proclaim the beginning of the good news in and through our lives of discipleships, a discipleship marked by our baptismal promises to:

Live among God's faithful people.

Hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper.

Proclaim the good news of God in Christ through words and deed.

Serve all people, following the example of Jesus.

Strive for justice and peace in all the earth. (ELW, page 236).



Lutheran World Relief School Kit Collection

Collection Through August 9th

WELCA is collecting the items listed below to make school kits for Lutheran World Relief. You may drop of your donation at the display in the Welcome Center.

Why school supplies? To the children who receive School Kits, these supplies mean the difference between getting an education or not. Public school is usually free, but in the places where LWR works, even a few required supplies, like pens and paper, may be more than many families can afford.



Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately $8"X 10\frac{1}{2}"$; no loose-leaf paper

One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other



Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band

One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)



 $\times 5$

One pencil sharpener

Five black or blue ballpoint pens (*no gel ink*) *secure together with a rubber band*

One $2\frac{1}{2}$ " eraser

One box of 16 or 24 crayon

We also collected used ink cartridges which were taken to Staples who give us a one-dollar credit per cartridge. This money is for general church office use, such as ink, staples, etc. The books we collect go to the Food Connection, for those who love to read but cannot afford books.

Besides our ongoing collections, we now need to step up our collecting of soda can tabs and also Campbell's soup labels. These two items will be taken to the convention in September.

The collecting of school supplies is under way, and we appreciate the wonderful support of the congregation! NOTE: We are not assembling the personal care kits with the entire congregation, they are being assembled on an individual basis only - so *please* donate only completed personal care kits. 
