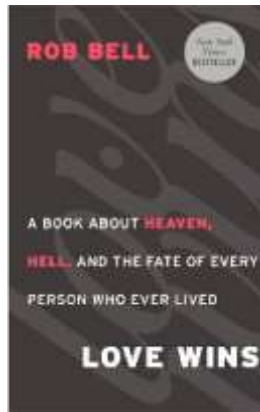

An era has ended

Oprah Winfrey has ended the 25-year run of her network television show, but the profound influence she has had on American culture continues through her TV network, print magazine, website and blog. In her “love letter” to her viewers, she describes her tumultuous journey and ascribes the success she has enjoyed to her “team and Jesus”.

“I have felt the presence of God my whole life. Even when I didn't have a name for it, I could feel the voice bigger than myself speaking to me, and all of us have that same voice. Be still and know it. You can acknowledge it or not. You can worship it or not. You can praise it, you can ignore it or you can know it. Know it. It's always there speaking to you and waiting for you to hear it in every move, in every decision. I wait and I listen. I'm still—I wait and listen for the guidance that's greater than my meager mind.”

Oprah’s brand of faith is not unique, and it’s not entirely Christian, either. It’s what researchers call “**Moralistic Therapeutic Deism**”, and is a common belief system articulated by young Americans. In the landmark 2005 “National Study of Youth and Religion”, researchers found that a large majority of teenagers consider themselves religious, and many of those say they are Christian. Faith matters to young people, but most are unable to clearly articulate what that faith entails. Moralistic Therapeutic Deism is a de facto belief system that describes a god who created the world and watches over it, and who wants people to be nice and fair. The goal of our life is to be happy and to feel good, and if we are good, we will go to heaven. It is a watered down version of the best and most appealing parts of all world religions, but is specific to none.

So, how do we overcome the profound influence popular media have on our children’s faith development? How do we teach them about the tenets of our faith?

Parents and mentors can validate the faith that children and youth share with us, and use their statements of belief as a jumping off point for conversation. Ask questions and go deeper. Challenge them with specific points to consider. For example, if your child says that she believes in a God who wants us to be good and fair to one another, show her places in the Bible where Jesus speaks of how we are to treat one another.

“Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled to them; then come and offer your gift” (Matthew 5:23-24).

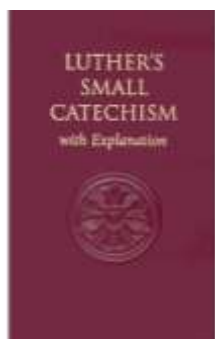
Take it a step further and ask if she has had experiences of reconciliation with a sibling or friend, or if she feels a current need for reconciliation.

But then there are those times when kids ask the deep questions, and we have no idea where to begin the answer, or we simply feel we don’t have the theological understanding to even ad-

dress the question. Ask someone who knows more to help you! You can introduce your child to another adult who can become a spiritual mentor for both of you.

Did you ever wonder how a hymn came to be written?

How Great Thou Art

"How Great Thou Art" is a well known hymn of praise among God's people. The translation to English was written by Stuart K. Hine (1899-1989), as well as the musical tune arrangement, with Manna Music of Swedish text. The text was based on the Bible scripture Psalm 145:3 "*Great is the Lord, and most worthy of praise; his greatness no one can fathom.*"

The original Swedish text was a poem entitled "O Store Gud," written in 1886 by a Swedish preacher Carl Boberg, a successful editor. Boberg's inspiration for "How Great Thou Art" came from a visit to a beautiful country estate on the southeast coast of Sweden. "He got caught in a midday thunderstorm with awe-inspiring moments of flashing violence, followed by a clear brilliant sun. Soon afterwards he heard the calm, sweet songs of the birds in nearby trees."

The experience prompted Boberg to "fall to his knees in humble adoration of his mighty God." A nine-stanza poem beginning with the Swedish words "O Store Gud, nar jag den varld beskader" captured his exaltation of how great God is. Years later, while attending a gathering in the Province of Varmland, Boberg was surprised to hear the congregation sing his poem to the tune of an old Swedish melody.

A Reflection on Human Dignity

Give justice to the weak and the orphan; maintain the right of the lowly and the destitute. – Psalm 82:3

Quite a few years ago, Lutheran Seminary Professor Karl H. Hertz wrote a handy small volume entitled “*Politics is a Way of Helping People*”. I’ve always liked that title (as well as the book itself) because it described for me a positive Christian outlook on what some consider an unworthy activity. Of course, politics can have and has had its decidedly lesser moments, but it has a great potential for public good that ought not to be underrated.

Our 1991 social statement, *The Church in Society: A Lutheran Perspective*, says, “The Gospel liberates from sin, death, and evil and motivates the church to care for the neighbor and the earth... Faith is active in love; love calls for justice in the relationships and structures of society. It is in grateful response to God’s grace in Jesus Christ that this church carries out its responsibility for the well-being of society and the environment.” We also believe that each person (believer or non-) is created in the image of God (*imago dei*) and that each therefore has dignity.

Internationally-recognized human rights can be understood as providing a legal (and secular) basis for protecting each person’s dignity. They and our church’s obligation “to advocate in hope with poor and powerless people” (*The Church in Society*) mean that where we and society – via government – choose our financial priorities say something about how we as Christians understand the fulfillment of these assertions.

As we and our legislators scrutinize federal budget priorities these claims should be foremost in our minds as well as our hearts. That is a call raised by A Circle of Protection signed by a growing number of religious Christian leaders.

What would it mean for human dignity if we reduce funding for international emergency response needs? How quickly could international groups, like UNICEF and the World Food Programme, as well as the U.S. Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance respond to earthquakes, tsunamis and severe drought of the kind we have faced in such the past two years?

What will budget cuts mean for our efforts to prevent the deaths of an estimated 6 million children under five worldwide who have treatable diseases or the half million women who die during pregnancy, most while giving birth or shortly thereafter? Great progress has been made in the global effort to prevent HIV and AIDS but, without public resources such as that provided by the President’s Emergency Plan For AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) for the past 8 years, this work, such as preventing transmission to 20,000 infants annually, will slow to a crawl or end.

For more than 70 years Lutherans in this country and around the world have responded to the needs of refugees seeking asylum from a well-founded fear of persecution. We have sponsored and resettled more than 351,000 in the U.S. alone partly using federal assistance. Some of these individuals have suffered some of the worst types of human rights abuses, such as torture. Even with the generous help for these new arrivals by members of our congregations, how can such opportunities to start a new life in fuller freedom continue without such essential help?

These programs serve the human faces whose plight would be affected. As we discuss the federal budget, are we and our political leaders thinking about them?

Prayer for the Journey

Lord, as we were all created in your image, help us pray for everyone who is not treated with dignity and respect. We ask for your guidance on how we can welcome the stranger in our midst. Give us the strength and courage to speak out with and for others who have not been permitted to realize the same unalienable rights as us. Make us instruments of your peace. Amen.
